The Waterbury Rotary Club of Waterbury, Vermont has raised over \$7000 toward the medical clinic that will be built in Lanet in the coming year. in Kampi ya moto, an arid region in Kenya that literally translates to "Camp of Fire". Everyone's Child has been partnering with CBN since 2011 to bring potable drinking water to the area. An effort was made to dig a well

there, but when it came up dry, CBN contracted with a local company to install a rain harvesting system. The gutters are in place and the job is nearly done!
